“ Ed was stationed at the U.S. Naval Security Group (USNSGA) Todendorf, Germany in the mid 1960's. When I arrived in 1968, it was several years after he had been transferred. He was still being praised by the civilian German National workers as being their favorite Officer, and they said that they wished he were still there. It wasn't until the mid 1970's, after I returned from my tours at USNSGA Todendorf, Germany, and USNSGA Edzell, Scotland, that I met Ed at a Illinois Naval Militia Officer's Mess (INMOM) Dinner at the Naval Reserve Center on Randolph Street in Chicago. I remember him as being very serious in his initial response to my inquiries about our common acquaintances at Todendorf, but as the evening progressed, it was obvious that he was the spark plug that kept the event enjoyable for all. In the 4 decades since, Ed was that same spark plug at all subsequent INMOM events. So I feel confident that I can speak for all those German National Workers and myself in saying that Ed will be missed, and that we all wish him "Fair Winds and Following Seas".
